Associated Public Schools Sport

Mission Statement

The mission of APS Sport is to provide a comprehensive and high quality sporting competition for the students of the schools of the Associated Public Schools of Victoria and thereby foster individual and team development for all.

APS Sport aims to:

Promote health and fitness and inculcate values of teamwork and fair play through participation;

Provide high quality sporting competition commensurate with the age and ability of students;

Provide a safe competition with appropriate facilities;

Foster individual talent, leadership, team spirit and ethical behaviour in all students.

Standards of Behaviour

Players are responsible for conforming to the spirit as well as the letter of the rules. Most of us can clearly distinguish between fair play and gamesmanship, or taking advantage of loopholes in the rules. The home captain should extend the normal courtesies of a host to visiting teams.

Spectators:

Whatever interferes with the orderly conduct of an event, or the comfort and freedom of others to watch and enjoy the event is unacceptable.

Spectators are encouraged to applaud good play by both sides.

There should be no streamers, either in rolls or bunches, banners, bugles, car horns, or other noisy instruments.

There should be no cheerleaders or other exhibitionists.

Areas used by spectators should be left free of litter.

Caulfield

The only people permitted near team gatherings at quarter, half and three quarter times are the Coach, the players and team officials. Parents and other spectators must remain off the oval.

Coaches are expected to set the example to others at all times and ensure that the spirit of the game and the essence of the regulations are upheld.

General

The teacher-in-charge of each team is bound to insist that players make the ball their objective. They will not allow such practices as the deliberate annoying or "niggling" of a player by his opponent, especially when the ball is in another section of the ground.

Coaches should not wander onto the field. It is also undesirable that Coaches continually shout directions to their teams, though an occasional "watch your goal", "pick up your opponent" seems reasonable. Any other comments should be confined to encouragement when students are in close proximity - never to criticising a student.

The "order off" rule shall apply to all age groupings. A player ordered from the field shall return only at the umpire's instruction. No ordered off player shall be replaced

A 25 metre penalty will be used instead of the 50 metre law.

Man on the Mark. There is only one man on the mark; movement or jumping upwards is permissible, provided there is no movement over the mark. There shall be no shouting, whistling, throwing or pretending to throw an object. There shall be no deliberate distraction by other players.

Umpires are to penalise breaches of these regulations with the football penalty.

Centre Bounce. The line through the centre circle is not applicable to APS Football.

A team (other than 1st XVIII) shall consist of any number of players who may be used at the discretion of the coach provided that there are not more than 18 players on the field during any playing time.

One runner could be used at all levels, provided that the runner is a student at the School and has a distinguishable jumper (white top) and School tracksuit pants.

No gloves will be worn in APS Football competition.

The boundary line, the goal squares and the centre circle are to be clearly marked with

white lines. Flags must **not** be used to indicate the boundary.

Schools are required to ensure that spectators do not enter the arena during the intervals and keep away from the goals so the goal umpire can move freely.

Umpires. There must be no abuse or intimidation of any umpire (central, goal or boundary) by either players or spectators.

Teams Short of players. A match should not be cancelled if a team is short of players. There are two options:

a) The team short of players be given some players by the other team to make up equal numbers, or



b) Both teams field the same number of players as the team that is short.

Note, the recommended minimum players to make a game is 14.

Mercy Rule/Termination Score. The Mercy rule will be invoked when a team is 10 goals ahead. When one team leads by 10 goals the following strategies will apply:

a) After a point is scored, restart play at the back of the centre square;

b) After a goal is scored, restart play with possession in the centre circle.

c) The coaches should rearrange positions to reduce the dominance of the team.

If the score difference exceeds 15 goals, the game is terminated and teams are mixed up to provide a more even competition for the duration of the match. The Home team must provide bibs for this situation.

CGS Standards of Behaviour

A student's involvement in the sports program is an extension of their involvement in the classroom. As such, the same standards and expectations of behavior apply at both training and sports matches.

In keeping with the overall ethos of both the CGS and APS Sports Program in general, all students are expected to display the utmost sportsmanship at all times, regardless of the result or the action of opposition teams or players. It is expected that Caulfield Grammar School students "set the standard" in this area. Students who behave inappropriately at training or in matches may find themselves subject to disciplinary action.

Uniforms & Match Days

Jumpers

Long or short sleeved School Football jumpers. T-shirts are not to be worn under short sleeved jumpers.

Caulfield

Shorts

All Students (except 1st XVIII) must wear white shorts in away games and blue shorts in home Games.

1st XVIII wear blues shorts for home and away games.

Bicycle shorts are not permitted unless the student produces a medical certificate. If worn, they must be skin colour or the same colour as the School shorts.

Numbers

Jumper numbers are allocated at the start of each year in consultation with the team coach.

Mouthguards

Wearing of mouthguards is strongly recommended.

Appointment of Captains

Captains are appointed by coaches on a rotation basis except for Senior Teams where the captains are appointed by the player group.

Arriving and Leaving Matches

Students must wear either School uniform or School track suit to games. This regulation also applies to students going home after practices.

Game Duration

For all games other than 1st XVIII, games run for $4 \ge 20$ minutes quarters with no time on. Intervals are 3 minutes at quarter and three quarter time with 12 minutes for half time.

Sickness on Match Days

In the event of a player who has been selected to play not being able to attend the game for reason of illness, accident etc. he is asked to bring a note to his Campus Head of Sport upon return to school. Parents should also try to contact either the Coach, Team Manager or another member of the team to advise of their child's absence.

No matter the level, they were part of the CGS 1st XVIII Open football squad of 2015. I thank every young man who strived throughout the season – one of the most competitive for places one could experience. Now more than ever, earning a first XVIII football jumper is a mountain to be climbed and there is no shame in not having quite reached that summit. The quality of the 2nd XVIII this year was exceptional – perhaps the strongest ever at CGS. The final 2 wins and the team camaraderie experienced on the last 2 games of the season against Haileybury, reflected just how privileged the boys have been to be part of this group, and how privileged we are to be a part of this special School.

To win/loss ratios in the 1st XVIII – 7 super wins – the best against MGS and HY as they were 2 talented teams with their best squads available. A fantastic victory over Xavier, having been needlessly confronted in the 3rd quarter; tough victories over Geelong Grammar and Wesley and two thrashings of Carey and GC. The Scotch loss was the low point, as we know we had them covered on the day, while we had an equally poor quarter against BGS which blew our

Chris Judd

When Chris Judd went down with a career ending knee injury in the match at the MCG against Adelaide last year the whole football world was in shock. As a footballer, Chris was as good as any who came before him. His individual honours included two club best and fairest awards and All Australian selections (2004 and 2006), the 2004 Brownlow Medal and the 2005 Norm Smith Medal, while he captained the Eagles to the 2006 premiership. At Carlton he won three consecutive best and fairest awards (2008-2010), four consecutive All Australian selections (2008-11) and the 2010 Brownlow Medal.

But despite the numerous individual honours Chris recalls the 2006 Premiership as his career highlight describing it as "hands, head and shoulders above the rest."

Two shoulder reconstructions by the age of 17 limited the number of times he was able to represent the School but he captained the 1st XVIII in 2001, the year he was drafted. In one memorable display that year he kicked not Chris at school or since. Chris attended the school during the years when Stephen Newton was the Principal. When asked to comment on Chris' time at CGS and the legacy he has left, Stephen wrote "Chris just got on with the job - whether it was in his studies, the range of House and School activities, or particularly in sport. Whatever it was, there was Chris making the most of the opportunity. Importantly though, then as now, Chris let his actions speak for him. In this way he earned and has continued to earn the very great respect of students, past and present, parents and members of staff."

Chris possesses a strong social conscience and supports many worthy causes and has been a big supporter of CGS. Through his honest endeavours, on and off the football field, Chris has lavished praise on the School and in so doing has become one of it's most respected and recognised past students. The CGS community wishes Chris and his family the very best for his future honest endeavours.

Caulfield Grammarians and the VFL/AFL

There is a long history of Caulfield Grammarians in the VFL/AFL with over 50 Grammarians having played at the elite level.

Interesting facts include:

• In 2015 three CGS players made their AFL debut being Luke Lowden, Daniel McKenzie and Lukas Webb. For Dan and Lukas it took only one year to make their debuts but Luke's 6 year wait to play at the highest levels is one of football's great stories of persistence. Similarly Callum Sinclair endured a horrendous run of injuries before establishing himself in the West Coast Eagles team culminating in the 2015 AFL Grand Final.

• The player who has played most games is Chris Judd (279) and most goals is also Chris Judd (228) followed by Ron Evans (209) the former Essendon and AFL President. Ron headed the VFL goalkicking list in 1959 and 1960.

• Frank Langley was best on ground in Melbourne's 1900 Premiership. Other premiership players include Les White (Essendon 1912), Dean Anderson (Hawthorn 1989 & 1991) and Chris Judd (Eagles 2006). Taylor Duryea is CGS's latest dual premiership player (Hawthorn 2014 and 2015). Will Taylor and the Hawks achieve the 'three-peat' in 2016?

• Brownlow Medallists have been John Schultz in 1960 and Chris Judd in 2004 and 2010.

• Schultz played 24 games for Victoria (and was an All Australian in 1961). Other players to represent Victoria were Jim Taylor, Lance Wilkinson, Stephen Newport, Dean Anderson, Ron Evans and Duncan Kellaway.

• The first Caulfield Grammarian to play VFL football was Stanley Reid (1896-1897) who played two seasons with Fitzroy before serving in the Boer war where he was killed.
